NELTA Conference Phase II, Chitwan Highlights 22 February 2012

Inauguration Session

The 17th International Conference of Nepal English Language Teachers' Association (NELTA) Phase II was held on 22-23 February, 2012 at Small Heaven Higher Secondary School, Kalvanpur, Chitwan. Master of the Ceremony (MC) Mr. Eka Dev Adhikari, Secretary, NELTA Chitwan Branch opened the session welcoming the Chief Guest, Mr Kishore Thapa, Secretary of Ministry of Education, Nepal, all the national and international delicates, representatives from the US Embassy, British Council, media people and all the participants, presenters from home and abroad. Then Mr. Adhikari gave short introduction about NELTA, about its vision and mission. Mr. Issori Prasad Sapkota, Jt. Secretary NELTA Chitwan distributed Badges to the guests.

The number of participants in the NELTA conference organized in Kathmandu and Chitwan shows the growing interest of the stakeholders and ELT professionals in English language teaching. NELTA Conference has offered opportunities for sharing experiences with national and international experts and learning from each other's experiences. the collaboration of national organizations, schools, colleges, publishers, the British Council, US agency

and the Indian Embassy for joining hands in convening this conference.

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Likewise, **Professor Tith Raj Khaniya** expressed that NELTA has been offering a lot but yet to do more. The international conference in two places has aroused such a great interest to participate in the conference as a special event. He appreciated NELTA for playing effective role to connect it with the international communities.

Prof Khaniya revealed that the Secretary of Ministry of Education, who has become the Chief Guest of the inaugural ceremony, in Chitwan, has strong academic background. His presence in NELTA as a Chief Guest will allow us to work with him. Prof Khaniya also reiterated his discussion with Prof Rod Ellis, to look into the possibility to collaborate in the ELT with NELTA. He requested the Secretary to note the publications of NELTA. We want to prove through the evidence – what NELTA has been doing. One of the key evidences is the presence of Prof Rod Ellis, who is the world class academic and has carried out tremendous research in task based in ELT.

Prof Khaniya said NELTA would need the support of the Secretary. Ministry of Education has already introduced a policy of introducing English from grade I, but what happens while doing so without preparing human resources. Government should be very serious to implement it. Moreover, he also emphasized on the need of collaboration with the international agencies to develop new methods to make our teaching with new techniques.

Highlighting another issue, Prof Khaniya said that NELTA is born as a non-political organization that we thought in the beginning; the moment we start playing a game, it will create a problem. However, it does not mean that NELTA will do that. The moment I join NELTA, I should be non-political. NELTA is a culture. The challenge of these days is people's inability to distinguish political and non-political arena. Many orgs disappeared, but we have been able to invite the attention of the international community, chiefly, British Council, the US State Department and now with the Indian Embassy as well. NELTA has played important role to maintain such relationship.

Mr. Batuk Lal Tamang stated, 'We are here because NELTA is here and NELTA is here because we are here'. NELTA is the name of a network, so he urged, it is required that all the ELT professionals and practitioners join NELTA to make the networking of ELT stronger. He said that since the conception of NELTA Chitwan branch, the NELTA activists of Chitwan branch had a dream to organize the International Conference at least once. Now it is going to be true. He added that the step of organizing the International Conference in Chitwan was a milestone for the branch. He urged other branches to be the strong part of such great networking and to experience such opportunity and challenges of professional development. He claimed that the program was not the end of the local activities, but the beginning. He requested RELO of American Embassy Mr. Fife MacDuff and NELTA Central Committee President Mr. Hemanta Raj Dahal to provide any kind remarkable ELT programs for Chitwan. NELTA Chitwan activists were ready to accomplish all kinds of duties required. He expressed his sincere gratitude to the NELTA Central Committee who entrusted them and gave the chance to organize the great program. He thanked all the supporters, well-wishers, distinguished guests, presenters, participants and journalists for their kind and encouraging co-operation.

Mr. Bel Bahadur Gurung, Chair, PABSON Chitwan, expressed that it was a great opportunity for the people from Chitwan to organize such an important event. He said that such programmes are always important to enhance the teachers' skills in teaching along with the learning skills of the students. The development of English is required to develop the academic status in the modern world, he added.

He said that the perfection in second language is always an ongoing activity and such type of conferences are instrumental in widening the horizon of teaching and thus make the teaching-learning task a real success.

Our pride is our professionalism that though a human being carries political ideologies, nobody brings politics inside NELTA.

Moreover, the proposed ELT survey, we believe, will be invaluable to provide ELT policy input to Ministry of Education and National Planning Commission, so that Government of Nepal shall have solid foundation of literature to decide the role and impact of English language teaching in New Federal Republic of Nepal.

We have witnessed rapid growth of NELTA with more than 5000 members, 34 branches that cover almost 50 districts in the country ranging from the far east to the far west. NELTA is also the affiliate member to the TESOL and IATEFL.

In Chitwan, there are 2 key and 2 plenary speeches, and 68 papers from 10 countries covering USA, UK, Nepal, Afghanistan, Singapore, India, Japan, South Africa, Bangladesh, and Sri Lanka. These deliberations address various issues of teaching English through sharing experiences and presenting findings from research projects. The highlights of this conference are the two globally recognized key speakers. Professor Fredricka L. Stoller, Northern Arizona University, USA, and Angi Malderez, an Honorary Senior Fellow of the School of Education, the University of Leeds, UK and the leading figure in teacher mentoring.

We hope this conference will provide a fruitful avenue to the teachers of English in Nepal to learn through sharing and to connect them globally.
